A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE SUBMISSION OF A GRANT APPLICATION TO THE WYOMING OFFICE OF HOMELAND SECURITY FOR THE FFY 2025 STATE HOMELAND SECURITY GRANT PROGRAM (SHSP), ON BEHALF OF THE GOVERNING BODY OF LARAMIE COUNTY, WYOMING TO REQUEST FUNDING IN THE AMOUNT OF \$316,048.42.

FOR THE PURPOSE OF: REQUESTED FUNDS WILL BE USED TO PURCHASE LIVESTOCK PANELS FOR THE LARAMIE COUNTY EVENTS DEPARTMENT FOR ANIMAL CONTAINMENT IN EMERGENCIES.

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the Wyoming Office of Homeland Security receives FFY 2025 SHSP funds from the Federal Emergency Management Agency and;

WHEREAS, the Wyoming Office of Homeland Security distributes a portion of these FFY 2025 SHSP funds to Wyoming Counties and;

WHEREAS, the Laramie County Board of Commissioners is eligible to apply for and receive FFY 2025 SHSP funds for the Laramie County Events Department and;

2. Briefly describe your project.

Laramie County is requesting funding to purchase and install enclosed livestock stall panels. This project addresses a critical gap in the county's emergency preparedness: the safe containment and temporary housing of displaced livestock during catastrophic and terrorist events.

To address this need, Laramie County proposes establishing a centralized, safe, and ready-to-use livestock containment system at the Archer Complex—a County owned facility designated as an emergency operations hub. The requested panels will be used to create enclosed stalls that support animal isolation, reducing the risk of injury and disease transmission among housed animals.

Designed for flexibility and durability, the panels accommodate various animal species and withstand the harsh conditions with wildfire evacuations, floods, hazardous material incidents, and other large-scale disasters. The panels are prefabricated with interlocking construction that allows for quick assembly and reconfiguration, while the durable materials are resistant to chemicals and easily disinfected, further minimizing the risk of contamination.

Investing in this infrastructure will strengthen Laramie County's emergency response capabilities, safeguard animal welfare, reduce chaos during evacuations, and support the agricultural community, an essential part of the region's economy and identity.

3. Describe how this project supports efforts to build, sustain, and deliver the capabilities necessary to prevent, prepare for, protect against, and respond to acts of terrorism.

This project enhances Laramie County's capacity to deliver critical services during catastrophic events, including targeted terrorist attacks. By purchasing portable livestock panels and constructing animal sheltering pens, the Archer Complex, located at 3801 Archer Parkway, Cheyenne, Wyoming 82009, will become a safe, organized, and monitored facility capable of housing displaced livestock during emergencies.

The panels ensure animals are kept in sanitary, secure, and segregated spaces to reduce injury, prevent cross-contamination of disease, and provide a centralized location for veterinary care. In the event of a biological threat, such as agricultural terrorism or an animal disease outbreak, the facility will also support quarantine operations by isolating exposed livestock until cleared by the State Veterinarian.

In March 2024, a fast-moving grass fire ignited east of Cheyenne under extreme wind conditions. Driven by 60+ mph gusts, flames spread across the prairie at several acres per minute, quickly jumping roads and threatening multiple rural subdivisions. Mandatory evacuations were issued along Happy Jack Road and Horse Creek Road. Residents had little time to react, and many were forced to make immediate decisions about evacuating animals. While shelters for people were activated swiftly, resources for displaced livestock were severely limited. Animals were temporarily staged in parking lots, fairground outbuildings, and private homes. Several of these temporary arrangements failed to provide adequate containment, separation, and sanitation, which heightened stress for animals and their owners and made care and accountability more difficult during an already chaotic evacuation. Had livestock pens been available at the Archer Complex, displaced animals could have been quickly and safely housed. A secure and centralized sheltering site would have supported faster reunification with owners, reduced stress, and allowed first responders to concentrate on fire suppression and public safety.

This investment directly strengthens the county's ability to prepare for, respond to, and recover from all hazards, including acts of terrorism. It expands Laramie County's capacity to provide Mass Care Services for animals, helping maintain continuity of operations, supporting animal agriculture protection, and reducing public health risks in crisis events. This resource also supports preparedness for targeted attacks on the food supply by enabling immediate containment and isolation of exposed livestock. Protecting animal agriculture is vital to public health, economic stability, and continuity of operations which are core priorities of homeland security efforts.

This investment in livestock panels supports THIRA's call for increased community resilience, improved coordination of evacuation and sheltering operations, and protection of critical infrastructure and agriculture, while reducing stress and confusion for residents during an evacuation incident. By equipping the Archer Complex with portable livestock panels and constructing organized animal pens, this project provides an immediate solution to a key capability shortfall.

These stalls would enable rapid accessibility to an animal sheltering infrastructure that is sanitary, secure, and centralized to support efficient veterinary treatment and ongoing monitoring if needed. In addition, this project enhances Laramie County's quarantine capabilities in the event of a communicable disease exposure, reinforcing the county's capacity to contain outbreaks. These panels and the resulting stalls will also strengthen Laramie County's ability to respond to acts of terrorism, thereby protecting public health and economic stability.

This project directly addresses several capability gaps identified in the Laramie County THIRA, particularly in the areas of Community Resilience and Environmental Response/Health and Safety. Procuring livestock panels in advance of terrorist or catastrophic events supports community resilience by enabling the rapid containment and protection of displaced animals in a central hub, reducing chaos and loss. This also promotes environmental response and health and safety by preventing the spread of disease, minimizing environmental contamination, and ensuring humane care for livestock during emergencies. The lack of a dedicated infrastructure for emergency livestock sheltering was evident during the March 2024 grass fire. Some of the temporary housing was unmonitored, lacked adequate water and forage, and was hard to keep clean leading to potential unsanitary conditions. Also, treatment of injured or sick animals was difficult when the temporary housing did not allow for proper restraint and treatment of the animals. The gap in coordinated animal sheltering undermines safe evacuations, increases public health risks, complicates accountability, and diverts first responders from critical life safety operations.

10. Explain how your project, if funded, would be maintained, supported, and sustained.

To ensure operational readiness, the panels will be inventoried and tracked through the County's asset management system. County staff will conduct routine inspections to identify wear or damage, perform basic maintenance and cleaning, and sanitize the panels after each deployment. These activities will be scheduled after every use, ensuring that the equipment remains in good working condition and ready for immediate response. This proactive maintenance approach reduces the need for costly replacements and ensures compliance with health and safety standards.

The livestock panels require minimal ongoing costs for upkeep, and the County does not anticipate the need for recurring grant funding to support their long-term use. Replacement parts and routine supplies will be funded through existing operational budgets and cooperative agreements with local partners. This practical, sustainable strategy ensures the panels contribute meaningfully to emergency preparedness without creating future financial burdens.

Sustainment of this capability will be achieved through strong partnerships with regional fairgrounds, local animal welfare organizations, cooperative extension services, and the Wyoming State Veterinarian's Office. These partners have committed to supporting annual training exercises, providing technical expertise, and assisting with emergency deployments when needed. Their involvement enhances the

operational effectiveness of the panels while fostering community wide resilience and interagency coordination. The proposed project will establish a sustainable, multi-functional livestock containment capability through the deployment of portable livestock panels, stored and managed at the Archer Complex. These panels will serve a critical role in supporting community resilience and environmental health during terrorist or catastrophic events by enabling the safe, humane containment of displaced or at-risk livestock in a centralized location. Rapid containment mitigates the risk of animal escape, injuries, and contamination of surrounding environments, while also preventing the spread of zoonotic diseases that can arise when livestock is left unmanaged after disasters.

By integrating the livestock panels into the County's broader emergency response framework, the project maximizes the return on federal investment while building a more resilient, prepared, and environmentally secure community.
