AWARD CONTRACT BETWEEN STATE OF WYOMING, OFFICE OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL, DIVISION OF CRIMINAL INVESTIGATION AND LARAMIE COUNTY, WYOMING

- Parties. The parties to this Contract are the State of Wyoming, Office of the Attorney General, Division of Criminal Investigation (Division), whose address is 208 S. College Drive, Cheyenne, WY 82002, and Laramie County, Wyoming (Subrecipient), whose address is 1910 Pioneer Avenue, Cheyenne, WY 82001. The Subrecipient UEI is E9DLJC1HGNQ8, the EIN is 83-600111, and Vendor Code is 86730
- 2. Purpose of Contract. The purpose of this Contract is to provide grant funds (the "award") to State of Wyoming entities to create and foster safer neighborhoods through a sustained reduction in violent crime. The goals of Project Safe Neighborhood (PSN) include (1) creating and implementing sustainable collaborations and comprehensive violent crime reduction strategies with federal, state, local, tribal, and territorial law enforcement officials, prosecutors, community-based partners, and other stakeholders to address the most pressing violent crime problems in a community; (2) fostering community trust in, and increasing legitimacy of, federal, state, and local law enforcement entities through the development of violent crime reduction strategies, public education approaches, and transparent accountability mechanisms; and (3) effectively using intelligence data to identify violent crime drivers and individuals at risk of violence victimization or perpetration in order to intervene, prevent, and improve outcomes. PSN provides the critical funding, resources, and training to combat violent crime and make communities safer through a comprehensive approach to public safety.

The Subrecipient shall utilize the award in accordance with applicable federal law, state law, and the grant application and budgets on file at the Division. The Subrecipient agrees to adhere to all federal grant requirements and the assurances contained in Attachment A, Special Conditions, and Attachment B, U.S. General Accounting Office Government Auditing Standards and Audit Requirements of 2 C.F.R Part 200, Subpart F, which are attached to and incorporated into this Contract and are being signed contemporaneously with this Contract. Any use of the term "Contract" herein refers to this Contract, Attachment A, and Attachment B. This Contract does not include funding for Research and Development (R&D) projects.

3. <u>Term of Contract</u>. This Contract is effective when all parties have executed it (Effective Date). The term of this Contract is from the Effective Date through September 15, 2025.

4. Reimbursement.

A. Reimbursement. The Division agrees to reimburse the Subrecipient for services, purchases, and expenses incurred as outlined in the Subrecipient's application for the PSN award. The total reimbursement under this Contract shall not exceed eleven thousand, five hundred forty-three dollars (\$11,543,00). No reimbursement

shall be made prior to the Effective Date of this Contract. The <u>MAXIMUM</u> amount payable under this Contract is eleven thousand, five hundred forty-three dollars (\$11,543.00) and is allocated as follows:

- i) The following federal funds must be used in accordance with the proposal approved by the committee.
 - a) PSN: \$11,543.00 Funds will be paid from the 15PBJA-22-GG-00847-GUNP Project Safe Neighborhoods Grant, Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, Bureaus of Justice Assistance, Assistance Listing # 16.609 (federal award date: 9/28/2022).

B. Suspension of Reimbursement.

i) If the Subrecipient is not in compliance with this Contract, the Division may withhold reimbursement for the month following the noncompliance and suspend future reimbursements until the Subrecipient is in compliance. If the Subrecipient is not in compliance with the Contract, the Division may also suspend all future reimbursements and terminate the Contract.

5. Responsibilities of Subrecipient.

- A. Performance Accountability. The Subrecipient's governing body shall be accountable for the performance of this Contract.
- B. Compliance with Rules. The Subrecipient shall comply with all award conditions and all applicable requirements of federal statutes and regulations, including but not limited to the applicable terms in this Contract. In the event the Subrecipient's monthly statistics, fiscal records, progress reports, summary reports, performance data, or performance reports are thirty (30) days late, the Division may withhold further reimbursements until all reports are made current.
- C. Management Information System. The Subrecipient shall submit accurate information to the Division.
- **D.** Financial Records and Reports. The Subrecipient shall maintain accounting records and documents in accordance with generally accepted accounting procedures and provide financial reports as may be requested by the Division and as required by this Contract.
- E. Monitoring and Evaluation. The Subrecipient agrees to monitoring and evaluation of programs, services, and Contract compliance, to be conducted by staff of the Division in accordance with this Contract.
- F. Corrective Action. The Subrecipient shall take corrective action in a timely manner to remedy any deficiencies affecting compliance with this Contract. All

deficiencies must be brought to the Division immediately.

- G. Required Meetings. The Subrecipient will ensure representation at grantee meetings, and management and program trainings convened by or on behalf of the Division.
- H. Tribal Authorizing Resolution. A Subrecipient that proposes to provide direct services or assistance to residents on tribal lands should include in its application a resolution, a letter, affidavit, or other documentation, as appropriate, that demonstrates (as a legal matter) that the applicant has the requisite authorization from the tribe(s) to implement the proposed project on tribal lands.
- I. DNA Testing of Evidentiary Materials. If PSN funds are to be used for DNA testing of evidentiary materials, any resulting eligible DNA profiles must be uploaded to the Combined DNA Index System (CODIS, the national DNA database operated by the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) by a government DNA lab with access to CODIS. Subrecipients utilizing PSN funds for forensic genealogy testing must adhere to the DOJ Interim Policy Forensic Genealogical DNA Analysis and Searching available at https://www.justice.gov/olp/page/file/1204386/download.

6. Responsibilities of the Division.

- A. Consultation. The Division shall consult with and advise the Subrecipient, as necessary, to enable the Subrecipient to complete its duties under this Contract. The Subrecipient agrees to cooperate with the Division so the Division can complete its duties under this Contract and under the federal grant requirements.
- B. Withholding Payments. The Division shall reimburse the Subrecipient, within forty-five (45) days after receipt of monthly invoices pursuant to Wyo. Stat. § 16-6-602, unless the Subrecipient has failed to meet the requirements of this Contract, at which time the Division shall notify the applicable Subrecipient designee of such noncompliance. Failure to take prompt corrective action may result in the Division withholding reimbursements until appropriate corrective action has been taken. If corrective action is not taken, the Contract may be terminated under Section 8.S. of this Contract.
- C. Monitoring and Evaluation. The Division shall monitor and evaluate the Subrecipient's compliance with the conditions and provisions set forth in this Contract.

7. Special Provisions.

A. Interest on Funds. The Subrecipient may not draw interest payments on funds made available through this Contract.

- B. Prohibited Uses of Funds. Funds made available to the Subrecipient through this Contract shall be used for purposes specified in the Contract and as proposed in the grant proposal/application to the Project Safe Neighborhoods Selection Committee and not for any other purpose. Prohibited and allowable uses of funds are included in the DOJ Grants Financial Guide available at https://www.ojp.gov/funding/financialguidedoj/overview, which is incorporated herein. Prohibited uses include, but are not limited to:
 - i) Land acquisition,
 - ii) Compensation of federal employees,
 - iii) Travel of Department of Justice (DOJ) employees,
 - iv) Bonuses or commissions,
 - v) Lobbying,
 - vi) Fundraising,
 - vii) Corporate formation,
 - viii) Entertainment (amusement, diversion, social activities, and any associated costs),
 - ix) Fines and penalties,
 - x) Home office workspace and related utilities,
 - xi) Honoraria if the primary intent is to confer distinction on, or to symbolize respect, esteem, or admiration for the recipient of the honorarium.
 - xii) Bar charges/alcoholic beverages,
 - xiii) Membership fees to organizations whose primary activity is lobbying, and
 - xiv) Costs incurred outside the project period.
- C. Compliance for Full Term of Contract. The Subrecipient shall comply with all requirements of this Contract for the full term of this Contract.
- **D.** Prohibition of Subcontracting. The Subrecipient shall not subcontract any rights or duties under this Contract without prior written approval of the Division. If the Division approves a subcontract arrangement by the Subrecipient, the Subrecipient shall retain full program and fiscal responsibility for subcontracted duties.
- E. No Finder's Fees. No finder's fee, employment agency fee, or other such fee related to the procurement of this Contract shall be paid by either party.
- F. Nondiscrimination. The Subrecipient shall comply with the Civil Rights Act of 1964, the Wyoming Fair Employment Practices Act (Wyo. Stat. § 27-9-105, et seq.), the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), 42 U.S.C. § 12101, et seq., and the Age Discrimination Act of 1975 and any properly promulgated rules and regulations thereto and shall not discriminate against any individual on the grounds of age, sex, color, race, religion, national origin, or disability in connection with the performance under this Contract.
- G. Limitations on Lobbying Activities. By signing this Contract, Subrecipient certifies and agrees that, in accordance with P.L. 101-121, payments made from a federal grant shall not be utilized by Subrecipient or its sub-subrecipients in

- connection with lobbying Congressmen, or any other federal agency in connection with the award of a federal grant, contract, cooperative agreement, or loan.
- H. Publicity. Any publicity given to the program or services provided herein, including, but not limited to, notices, information, pamphlets, press releases, research, reports, signs, and similar public notices in whatever form, prepared by or for the Subrecipient and related to the services and work to be performed under this Contract, shall identify the Division as the sponsoring agency and shall not be released without prior written approval of Division. If the publicity is funded by this award and is publicized through a website, the website shall also comply with Attachment A, ¶43.
- I. Human Trafficking. As required by 22 U.S.C. 7104(g) and 2 C.F.R. Part 175, this Contract may be terminated without penalty if a private entity that receives funds under this Contract:
 - i) Engages in severe forms of trafficking in persons during the period of time the award is in effect;
 - ii) Procures a commercial sex act during the period of time the award is in effect; or
 - iii) Uses forced labor in the performance of the award or subawards under the award.
- J. Compliance with 8 U.S.C. 1373. As required by 8 U.S.C. 1373, Subrecipient shall not prohibit, or in any way restrict, any government entity or official from sending to, or receiving from, the Immigration and Naturalization Service information regarding the citizenship or immigration status, lawful or unlawful, of any individual.
- K. Federal Audit Requirements. Subrecipient agrees that if it expends an aggregate amount of seven hundred fifty thousand dollars (\$750,000.00) or more in federal funds during its fiscal year, it must undergo an organization-wide financial and compliance single audit. Subrecipient agrees to comply with the audit requirements of the U.S. General Accounting Office Government Auditing Standards and Audit Requirements of 2 C.F.R Part 200, Subpart F, (Attachment B). If findings are made which cover any part of this Contract, Subrecipient shall provide one (1) copy of the audit report to Division and require the release of the audit report by its auditor be held until adjusting entries are disclosed and made to Division's records.
- L. Indirect Cost. Certain Division subrecipients have the option of electing to use the "de minimis" indirect cost rate. An applicant that is eligible to use the "de minimis" rate and that wishes to use the "de minimis" rate should attach written documentation to the application that advises the Division of both (1) the applicant's eligibility to use the "de minimis" rate, and (2) its election to do so. If an eligible applicant elects the "de minimis" rate, costs must be consistently charged as either indirect or direct costs, but may not be double charged or

inconsistently charged as both. The "de minimis" rate may no longer be used once an approved federally negotiated indirect cost rate is in place. (No entity that ever has had a federally approved negotiated indirect cost rate is eligible to use the "de minimis" rate.) For the "de minimis" rate requirements (including on eligibility to elect to use the rate), see 2 C.F.R. 200.414(f).

- M. Assumption of Risk. The Subrecipient shall be responsible for any loss of funding, either administrative or program dollars, due to the Subrecipient's failure to comply with state or federal requirements. The Division shall notify the Subrecipient of any state or federal determination of noncompliance.
- N. Suspension and Debarment. By signing this Contract, Subrecipient certifies that neither it nor its principals/agents are presently debarred, suspended, proposed for debarment, declared ineligible, or voluntarily excluded from participation in this transaction or from receiving federal financial or nonfinancial assistance, nor are any of the participants involved in the execution of this Contract suspended, debarred, or voluntarily excluded by any federal department or agency in accordance with Executive Order 12549 (Debarment and Suspension), 44 CFR Part 17, or 2 CFR Part 180, or are on the debarred, or otherwise ineligible, vendors lists maintained by the federal government. Further, Subrecipient agrees to notify Division by certified mail should it or any of its principals/agents become ineligible for payment, debarred, suspended, or voluntarily excluded from receiving federal funds during the term of this Contract.
- O. Kickbacks. The Subrecipient certifies and warrants that no gratuities, kickbacks or contingency fees were paid in connection with this Contract, nor were any fees, commissions, gifts, or other considerations made contingent upon the award of this Contract. If the Subrecipient breaches or violates this warranty, the Division may, at its discretion, terminate this Contract without liability to the Division, or deduct from the Contract price or consideration, or otherwise recover, the full amount of any commission, percentage, brokerage, or contingency fee.

8. General Provisions.

- A. Amendments. Any changes, modifications, revisions or amendments to this Contract which are mutually agreed upon by the parties to this Contract shall be incorporated by written instrument, executed by all parties to this Contract.
- B. Applicable Law, Rules of Construction, and Venue. The construction, interpretation, and enforcement of this Contract shall be governed by the laws of the State of Wyoming, without regard to conflicts of law principles. The terms "hereof," "hereunder," "herein," and words of similar import, are intended to refer to this Contract as a whole and not to any particular provision or part. The Courts of the State of Wyoming shall have jurisdiction over this Contract and the parties. The venue shall be the First Judicial District, Laramie County, Wyoming.
- C. Assignment Prohibited and Contract Shall Not be Used as Collateral. Neither

party shall assign or otherwise transfer any of the rights or delegate any of the duties set forth in this Contract without the prior written consent of the other party. The Subrecipient shall not use this Contract, or any portion thereof, for collateral for any financial obligation without the prior written permission of the Division.

- D. Audit and Access to Records. The Division and its representatives shall have access to any books, documents, papers, electronic data, and records of the Subrecipient, which are pertinent to this Contract. The Division may request a standard audit of a Subrecipient's financial records to be completed at the Subrecipient's expense. The Subrecipient shall maintain such records for seven (7) years after termination of the Contract, or for one (1) year after the final resolution of any dispute arising from the Contract, whichever is later.
- E. Availability of Funds. Each payment obligation of the Division is conditioned upon the availability of government funds which are appropriated or allocated for the payment of this obligation and which may be limited for any reason including, but not limited to, congressional, legislative, gubernatorial, or administrative action; or denial of authorization of subaward by the Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs, or Bureau of Justice Assistance. If funds are not allocated and available for continued performance of the Contract, the Contract may be terminated by the Division at the end of the period for which the funds are available. The Division shall notify the Subrecipient at the earliest possible time of the services which will or may be affected by a shortage of funds. No penalty shall accrue to the Division in the event this provision is exercised, and the Division shall not be obligated or liable for any future payments due or for any damages as a result of termination under this section.
- F. Award of Related Contracts. The Division may award supplemental or successor contracts for work related to this Contract or may award contracts to other subrecipients for work related to this Contract. The Subrecipient shall cooperate fully with other subrecipients and the Division in all such cases.
- G. Compliance with Laws. The Subrecipient shall keep informed of and comply with all applicable federal, state, and local laws and regulations, and all federal grant requirements and executive orders in the performance of this Contract.
- H. Confidentiality of Information. Except when disclosure is required by the Wyoming Public Records Act or court order, all documents, data compilations, reports, computer programs, photographs, data, and other work provided to or produced by the Subrecipient in the performance of this Contract shall be kept confidential by the Subrecipient unless written permission is granted by the Division for its release. If and when Subrecipient receives a request for information subject to this Contract, Subrecipient shall notify Division within ten (10) days of such request and shall not release such information to a third party unless directed to do so by Division.

- I. Entirety of Contract. This Contract, consisting of eleven (11) pages; Attachment A, Special Conditions, consisting of seventeen (17) pages; and Attachment B, Subgrantee Audit Requirements per OMB Circular A-133, consisting of one (1) page, represent the entire and integrated Contract between the parties and supersede all prior negotiations, representations and agreements, whether written or oral. In the event of conflict between the language of this Contract and any attachments or documents incorporated by reference, this Contract shall control.
- J. Ethics. Subrecipient shall keep informed of and comply with the Wyoming Ethics and Disclosure Act (Wyo. Stat. § 9-13-101, et seq.) and any and all ethical standards governing Subrecipient's profession.
- K. Force Majeure. Neither party shall be liable for failure to perform under this Contract if such failure to perform arises out of causes beyond the control and without the fault or negligence of the nonperforming party. Such causes may include, but are not limited to, acts of God or the public enemy, fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions, freight embargoes, and unusually severe weather. This provision shall become effective only if the party failing to perform immediately notifies the other party of the extent and nature of the problem, limits delay in performance to that required by the event, and takes all reasonable steps to minimize delays.
- L. Indemnification. Each party to this Contract shall assume the risk of any liability arising from its own conduct. Neither party agrees to insure, defend, or indemnify the other.
- M. Independent Contractor. The Subrecipient shall function as an independent contractor for the purposes of this Contract and shall not be considered an employee of the State of Wyoming as a result of this Contract. Consistent with the express terms of this Contract, the Subrecipient shall be free from control or direction over the details of the performance of services under this Contract. The Subrecipient shall assume sole responsibility for any debts or liabilities that may be incurred by the Subrecipient in fulfilling the terms of this Contract, and shall be solely responsible for the payment of all federal, state, and local taxes which may accrue because of this Contract. Nothing in this Contract shall be interpreted as authorizing the Subrecipient or its agents or employees to act as an agent or representative for or on behalf of the State of Wyoming or the Division, or to incur any obligation of any kind on behalf of the State of Wyoming or the Division. The Subrecipient agrees that no health or hospitalization benefits, workers' compensation, unemployment insurance, or similar benefits available to State of Wyoming employees will inure to the benefit of the Subrecipient or the Subrecipient's agents or employees as a result of this Contract.
- N. Notices. All notices arising out of, or from, the provisions of this Contract shall be in writing and given to the parties at the address provided under this Contract, either by regular mail or delivery in person.

- O. Ownership and Return of Documents and Information. Division is the official custodian and owns all documents, data compilations, reports, computer programs, photographs, data, and other work provided to or produced by the Subrecipient in the performance of this Contract. Upon termination of services, for any reason, Subrecipient agrees to return all such original and derivative information and documents to the Division in a useable format. In the case of electronic transmission, such transmission shall be secured. The return of information by any other means shall be by a parcel service that utilizes tracking numbers.
- Prior Approval. This Contract shall not be binding upon either party, no services shall be performed, and the Wyoming State Auditor shall not draw warrants for payment, until this Contract has been fully executed, approved as to form by the Office of the Attorney General, filed with and approved by A&I Procurement, and approved by the Governor of the State of Wyoming, or his designee, if required by Wyo. Stat. § 9-2-1016(b)(iv).
- Q. Insurance Requirements. Subrecipient is protected by the Wyoming Governmental Claims Act, Wyo. Stat. § 1-39-101, et seq., and certifies that it is a member of the Wyoming Association of Risk Management (WARM) pool or the Local Government Liability Pool (LGLP), Wyo. Stat. § 1-42-201, et seq., and shall provide a letter verifying its participation in the WARM or LGLP to the Agency.
- R. Sovereign or Governmental Immunity. Pursuant to Wyo. Stat. § 1-39-104(a), the State of Wyoming and Division expressly reserve sovereign immunity by entering into this Contract and the Subrecipient expressly reserves governmental immunity. Each of them specifically retains all immunities and defenses available to them as sovereigns or governmental entities pursuant to Wyo. Stat. § 1-39-101, et seq., and all other applicable law. The parties acknowledge that the State of Wyoming has sovereign immunity and only the Wyoming Legislature has the power to waive sovereign immunity. Designations of venue, choice of law, enforcement actions, and similar provisions shall not be construed as a waiver of sovereign immunity. The parties agree that any ambiguity in this Contract shall not be strictly construed, either against or for either party, except that any ambiguity as to immunity shall be construed in favor of immunity.
- S. Termination of Contract. This Contract may be terminated, without cause, by either party upon thirty (30) days written notice of termination to the other party. This Contract may be terminated by the Division immediately for cause if the Subrecipient fails to perform in accordance with the terms and conditions set forth in this Contract.
- Third-Party Beneficiary Rights. The parties do not intend to create in any other individual or entity the status of third-party beneficiary, and this Contract shall not be construed so as to create such status. The rights, duties, and obligations contained in this Contract shall operate only between the parties to this Contract, and shall inure solely to the benefit of the parties to this Contract. The provisions

- of this Contract are intended only to assist the parties in determining and performing their obligations under this Contract.
- U. Titles Not Controlling. Titles of sections and subsections are for reference only and shall not be used to construe the language in this Contract.
- V. Waiver. The waiver of any breach of any term or condition in this Contract shall not be deemed a waiver of any prior or subsequent breach. Failure to object to a breach shall not constitute a waiver.
- W. Counterparts. This Contract may be executed in counterparts. Each counterpart, when executed and delivered, shall be deemed an original and all counterparts together shall constitute one and the same Contract. Delivery by the Subrecipient of an originally signed counterpart of this Contract by facsimile or PDF shall be followed up immediately by delivery of the originally signed counterpart to the Division.

1. Compliance with general appropriations-law restrictions on the use of federal funds (FY 2022). The recipient, and any subrecipient ("subgrantee") at any tier, must comply with all applicable restrictions on the use of federal funds set out in federal appropriations statutes. Pertinent restrictions, including from various "general provisions" in the Consolidated **Appropriations** Act, 2022, are set out at https://ojp.gov/funding/Explore/FY22AppropriationsRestrictions.htm, and are incorporated by reference here.

- 6. Effect of failure to address audit issues. By signing and accepting this award on behalf of the recipient, the authorized recipient official accepts all material requirements of the award, and specifically adopts, as if personally executed by the authorized recipient official, all assurances or certifications submitted by or on behalf of the recipient that relate to conduct during the period of performance.

Failure to comply with one or more award requirements -- whether a condition set out in full below, a condition incorporated by reference below, or an assurance or certification related to conduct during the award period -- may result in OJP taking appropriate action with respect to the recipient and the award. Among other things, the OJP may withhold award funds, disallow costs, or suspend or terminate the award. DOJ, including OJP, also may take other legal action as appropriate.

Any materially false, fictitious, or fraudulent statement to the federal government related to this award (or concealment or omission of a material fact) may be the subject of criminal prosecution (including under 18 U.S.C. 1001 and/or 1621, and/or 34 U.S.C. 10271-10273), and also may lead to imposition of civil penalties and administrative remedies for false claims or otherwise (including under 31 U.S.C. 3729-3730 and 3801-3812).

Should any provision of a requirement of this award be held to be invalid or unenforceable by its terms, that provision shall first be applied with a limited construction so as to give it the maximum effect permitted by law. Should it be held, instead, that the provision is utterly invalid or -unenforceable, such provision shall be deemed severable from this award.

8. Compliance with DOJ regulations pertaining to civil rights and nondiscrimination - 28 C.F.R. Part 38. The recipient, and any subrecipient ("subgrantee") at any tier, must comply with all applicable requirements of 28 C.F.R. - 11. <u>Compliance with 41 U.S.C. 4712 (including prohibitions on reprisal; notice to employees)</u>. The recipient (and any subrecipient at any tier) must comply with, and is subject to, all applicable provisions of 41 U.S.C. 4712, including all applicable provisions that prohibit, under specified circumstances, discrimination against an employee as reprisal for the employee's disclosure of information related to gross mismanagement of a federal grant, a gross waste of federal funds, an abuse of authority relating to a federal grant, a

substantial and specific danger to public health or safety, or a violation of law, rule, or regulation related to a federal grant.

- 13. Requirement for data on performance and effectiveness under the award. The recipient must collect and maintain data that measure the performance and effectiveness of work under this award. Data collection supports compliance with the Government Performance and Results Act (GPRA) and the GPRA Modernization Act of 2010, and other applicable laws.

2. Monitoring

The recipient's monitoring responsibilities include monitoring of subrecipient compliance with this condition.

3. Allowable costs

To the extent that such costs are not reimbursed under any other federal program, award funds may be obligated for the reasonable, necessary, and allocable costs (if any) of actions designed to ensure compliance with this condition.

4. Rules of construction

A. Staff involved in the hiring process

For purposes of this condition, persons "who are or will be involved in activities under this award" specifically includes (without limitation) any and all recipient (or any subrecipient) officials or other staff who are or will be involved in the hiring process with respect to a position that is or will be funded (in whole or in part) with award funds.

B. Employment eligibility confirmation with E-Verify

For purposes of satisfying the requirement of this condition regarding verification of employment eligibility, the recipient (or any subrecipient) may choose to participate in, and use, E-Verify (www.e-verify.gov), provided an appropriate person authorized to act on behalf of the recipient (or subrecipient) uses E-Verify (and follows the proper E-Verify procedures, including in the event of a "Tentative Nonconfirmation" or a "Final Nonconfirmation") to confirm employment eligibility for each hiring for a position in the United States that is or will be funded (in whole or in part) with award funds.

- C. "United States" specifically includes the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Guam, the Virgin Islands of the United States, and the Commonwealth of the Northern Mariana Islands.
- D. Nothing in this condition shall be understood to authorize or require any recipient, any subrecipient at any tier, or any person or other entity, to violate any federal law, including any applicable civil rights or nondiscrimination law.
- E. Nothing in this condition, including in paragraph 4.B., shall be understood to relieve any recipient, any subrecipient at any tier, or any person or other entity, of any obligation otherwise imposed by law, including 8 U.S.C. 1324a(a)(1).

21. Restrictions and certifications regarding non-disclosure agreements and related matters. No recipient or subrecipient ("subgrantee") under this award, or entity that receives a procurement contract or subcontract with any funds under this award, may require any employee or contractor to sign an internal confidentiality agreement or statement that prohibits or otherwise restricts, or purports to prohibit or restrict, the reporting (in accordance with law) of waste, fraud, or abuse to an investigative or law

enforcement representative of a federal department or agency authorized to receive such information.

The foregoing is not intended, and shall not be understood by the agency making this award, to contravene requirements applicable to Standard Form 312 (which relates to classified information), Form 4414 (which relates to sensitive compartmented information), or any other form issued by a federal department or agency governing the nondisclosure of classified information.

1. In accepting this award, the recipient—

a. represents that it neither requires nor has required internal confidentiality agreements or statements from employees or contractors that currently prohibit or otherwise currently restrict (or purport to prohibit or restrict) employees or contractors from reporting waste, fraud, or abuse as described above; and

b. certifies that, if it learns or is notified that it is or has been requiring its employees or contractors to execute agreements or statements that prohibit or otherwise restrict (or purport to prohibit or restrict), reporting of waste, fraud, or abuse as described above, it will immediately stop any further obligations of award funds, will provide prompt written notification to the federal agency making this award, and will resume (or permit resumption of) such obligations only if expressly authorized to do so by that agency.

2. If the recipient does or is authorized under this award to make subawards ("subgrants"), procurement contracts, or both—

a. it represents that—

(1) it has determined that no other entity that the recipient's application proposes may or will receive award funds (whether through a subaward ("subgrant"), procurement contract, or subcontract under a procurement contract) either requires or has required internal confidentiality agreements or statements from employees or contractors that currently prohibit or otherwise currently restrict (or purport to prohibit or restrict) employees or contractors from reporting waste, fraud, or abuse as described above; and

Reclassification of various statutory provisions to a new Title 34 of the United StatesCode. On September 1, 2017, various statutory provisions previously codified elsewhere in the U.S. Code were editorially reclassified (that is, moved and renumbered) to a new Title 34, entitled "Crime Control and Law Enforcement." The reclassification encompassed a number of statutory provisions pertinent to OJP awards (that is, OJP grants and cooperative agreements), including many provisions previously codified in Title 42 of the U.S. Code.
