This request for mobile radios is a continuation of a previously funded project with the objective of upgrading the Laramie County Sheriff's Office Operations Division. The project will bring the department into full compliance with the WyoLink communications system and completes

our interoperable communication needs. Mobile radios are a crucial component to providing infrastructure protection within Laramie County to ensure the Sheriff's Department meets all of the capabilities needed to mitigate a catastrophic event. These mobile radios will support our law enforcement efforts within the community and provide extended coverage and access to the Combined Communication Center. Our requested budget will cover purchasing up to seventy-five mobile radios, installation, and other accessories and equipment necessary to ensure proper functioning of the communications system. Our current mobile radios have had a long service life, and Motorola will be discontinuing service support for these radios this fall. The new mobile radios will be WyoLink compatible and Project 25 capable.

Our request supports the Wyoming Office of Homeland Security's mission to comply with the SAFECOM Guidance for Emergency Communications and aligns with the Statewide Communications Interoperability Plan. Mobile radios will be programed to interface with Statewide WyoLink requirements, allowing multi-jurisdictional usage. The mobile radios will provide the Laramie County Sheriff Department with enhanced operational communications.

All milestones from the 2017 grant have been achieved and we are moving forward with the purchasing of approved communication equipment under that award.

- 3. The last milestone of our project will occur in June 2019. During this milestone we will be completing the installation of the new radios into our existing fleet and providing any needed training to our deputies on proper use.
- 4. We estimate that our project will be completed and closed out by July 2019.

We are requesting funding to purchase fifty active shooter tactical plate carriers with level IV armor protection. The plate carriers will be used to help protect the lives our of law enforcement teams at these potential events. Responding to Active Shooter events are extremely dangerous situations for law enforcement officers around the country, with more and more of these shooters carrying out these acts

of mass violence using multiple firearms including high powered rifles. The standard soft body armor ballistic vests worn by Laramie County Sheriff's deputies provide no ballistic protection against high powered rifles. The requested tactical plate carriers offer front and back ballistic protection that are rated to stop bullets from high powered rifles. They are designed to deploy quickly during a crisis incident by placing overtop of the deputies standard uniforms to offer enhanced protection to their upper torso areas. In addition to Active Shooter events, the tactical plate carriers would be utilized when deputies are confronted with any type of armed gunman situation or other high risk situation to increase their level of protection.

Not for routine use - allowable only to supplement normal stores, in order to provide the surge capacity necessary for CBRNE terrorism response. Not for riot suppression. All Operation Stonegarden (OPSG) recipients will need to submit a detailed justification to the respective Program Analyst and obtain approval prior to the purchase of this equipment. Requests will be reviewed on a case-by-case basis.

Communication Maintenance and Sustainment Plan

The Department will inventory and track the assignment of the interoperable communication equipment. There is regular annual maintenance performed by technicians either through a maintenance contract or through an extended warranty. We intend to utilize the equipment as long as possible and as long as they are supported by Motorola or other vendors for service and parts. In the past, we have generally utilized interoperable equipment for 10 years or more before replacing them; generally using the old equipment as trade-ins.

Critical Infrastructure Protection

They serve as the security providers for the Detention Center as well as for the courthouse and other county government buildings located at the county government complex in downtown Cheyenne. Typically, they will be the first responders should there be a security response needed in the city or county courtrooms or in the event of a critical incident in the county government complex; and typically they will be responding before law enforcement is called to, or arrives at, the complex. Having proper communications is vital, and updating mobile radio capability to be in line with WyoLink and the county communications center is key to providing community protection.

Training and Exercise Plan

The Laramie County Sheriff's Department will train deputies on the proper use of the requested tactical plate carriers for both front and back protection at regular training sessions and joint operations exercises, which are normally held twice per month. The department will also provide training to deputies on the proper use and maintenance of mobile radios.

Purpose

The purpose of the Multi-year Training and Exercise Plan (TEP) is to document Laramie County's overall training and exercise program priorities for the 2018 and 2019 calendar years. It is considered to be a living document that can be updated and refined as needed. These priorities are linked to corresponding core capabilities, and, if applicable, a rationale based on existing strategic guidance, threat assessments, corrective actions from previous exercises, or other factors. This Multi-year TEP identifies the training and exercises that will help Laramie County build and sustain the core capabilities needed to address its training and exercise program priorities.

The 2018/2019 TEP lays out a combination of progressively building exercises – along with the associated training requirements. A progressive, 2018/2019 exercise program enables Laramie County and first responding organizations within to participate in a series of increasingly complex exercises, with each successive exercise building upon the previous one until mastery is achieved. Further, by including training requirements in the planning process, Laramie County can address known shortfalls prior to exercising capabilities.

The 2018/2019 TEP may also serve as a follow-on companion document to the State of Wyoming Multi-Year Training and Exercise Plan and in compliance with the Emergency Management Program Grant and the State Homeland Security Grant Program. This will provide a roadmap for Laramie County to follow in accomplishing the priorities described therein.

Included in this 2018/2019 TEP is a training and exercise schedule, which provides a graphic illustration of the proposed activities.

PROGRAM PRIORITIES

Laramie County's training and exercise program is prioritized by the needs of the emergency services community including the 15 emergency support functions and based off of the needs identified in the THIRA process. Each priority will align and identify the appropriate core capabilities to ensure all areas of the National Planning Systems key principals are met.

- 1. Incident Command and Operational Coordination
- 2. CBRNE and Hazardous Materials Identification
- 3. Communications and Interoperability

Incident Command and Operational Coordination

Incident Command (ICS) is mandated by Homeland Security Presidential Directive and is solely recognized as the national standard for incident command. By using ICS we can obtain operational coordination between all emergency support functions regardless of jurisdiction.

- Incorporate, reinforce, and verify lessons learned;
- Identify demonstrated capabilities and areas in need of improvement;
- Provide a means of evaluation and corrective action for exercises; and
- Ensure a method to share lessons learned and best practices from training courses and exercises.
