# Public Hearings/Rules & Reg's

**28.** PUBLIC HEARING regarding amendments to the amended 2019 Laramie County Land Use Regulations.

**Amendments** 

Justin Arnold, Planning, said Planning staff began reviewing the amended 2019 Laramie County Land Use Regulations (LCLUR) in 2021. Planning provided the Notice of Intent required under WS 16-3-103 and public comment was taken during the statutorily required 45-day period. Staff received two written comments. Mr. Arnold gave a synopsis of the proposed amendments.

Mr. Arnold said given the number of amendments to the LCLUR in recent years, Planning, in conjunction with Public Works, intends to do an indepth analysis of the LCLUR and promulgate a clean version. Chairman Thompson asked how the public could be involved with that process. Mr. Arnold noted there will be meetings with stakeholders and a 45-day public comment period.

Chairman Thompson opened the hearing for PUBLIC COMMENT. Steve True, resident, commended staff for the open house and voiced support for the proposed regulations, the public safety fees and work with fire suppression. Jason Caughey, Laramie County Fire Authority chief, addressed proposed recommendations for the fire protection plan for rural subdivisions, which he said was a collaborative effort based on what was fair, equitable, and reasonable, with a fundable and sustainable fee structure. Chief Caughey asked the Board to adopt the proposed amendments as written with no additional amendments.

Commissioner Malm thanked the fire districts for working on the proposed amendments and discussed a potential amendment. He said he is struggling with the fire station item and dedication of land for a fire station. Commissioner Malm said a developer is being asked, at today's prices, to sacrifice an additional \$125,000 to \$150,000 in value and and an additional \$1000 per lot fee. He referred to other instances when government entities require a dedication of land and it sits vacant.

Commissioner Holmes talked about the land dedication requirement and thought it was too much to put on a single developer. Commissioner Lovett expressed the need to identify placement of fire stations in comments during the planning process. Commissioner Heath said she favored a proactive approach and noted developers worked with the fire chiefs and fire districts and they are the appropriate ones to

determine placement of fire stations. She further noted she would be opposed to removing the item from the requirement. Hearing no further PUBLIC COMMENT, Chairman Thompson closed the hearing.

A motion was made by Commissioner Malm, seconded by Commissioner Holmes, to approve amendments to the amended 2019 Laramie County Land Use Regulations and approve the adoption of the 2019 Laramie County Land Use Regulations rulemaking draft amendments with the revisions contained in the staff report as changes, to be known as the Amendments to the Amended 2019 Laramie County Land Use Regulations, effective October 5, 2022.

A motion was made by Commissioner Malm, seconded by Vice Chairman Lovett, to amend by striking Section 1-1-106 C. i. Fire station development.

Commissioner Holmes argued against doing away with the fire station development section. Commissioner Malm pointed out a future developer may not be amenable and could provide a lot that would not be buildable for a fire station.

A motion was made by Commissioner Holmes, seconded by Commissioner Heath, to amend the amendment to read "land located in the proposed subdivision may be provided for future fire stations depending on the need of the fire districts." The motion failed by the following vote:

Chairman Thompson said he was not in favor of Commissioner Malm's amendment because the Board has tasked the fire chiefs to do this and striking the item was not in the best interests of those who worked on the amendments to the regulations. Commissioner Malm said he would vote no on his amendment in the hope another Roman numeral would be added to allow for Board approval.

The original amendment failed by the following vote:

A motion was made by Commissioner Malm, seconded by Commissioner Holmes, to amend Section 1-1-106 C. i. Fire station development and add Roman numeral iii to require approval by the Board of County Commissioners.

Commissioner Malm expressed concerns about the requirement being arbitrary such

as the one for cisterns. He noted some fire districts will review the criteria and request a fire station and others will not. Chairman Thompson said the requirement is definitive: It requires a fire station for proposed subdivisions greater than 25 units and further than 10 road miles from an existing fire station. He said the requirement will be in the staff report as a condition that will go before the elected board of county commissioners.

Commissioner Holmes talked about how developers do phases of projects and this may not trigger the requirement because the development is less than 25 lots. Chairman Thompson said this was covered in the document because it says all phases in five years are equal to total units.

Chairman Thompson opened the amendment discussion for PUBLIC COMMENT. Chief Caughey spoke in support of the amendment because it closes loopholes. Matt Butler, County Fire Warden, also spoke in favor of the amendment. Hearing no further PUBLIC COMMENT, Chairman Thompson closed the comment period.

The motion on the amendment carried by the following vote:

The Board directed Planning and the County Attorney to work on the language as intended by the Board.

Commissioners Malm and Holmes thanked the fire districts, county attorney and staff for their work and acknowledged input from the public on the proposed changes to the Rules and Regulations.
