A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE SUBMISSION OF A GRANT APPLICATION TO THE WYOMING OFFICE OF HOMELAND SECURITY FOR THE FFY 2019 STATE HOMELAND SECURITY GRANT PROGRAM (SHSP), ON BEHALF OF THE GOVERNING BODY OF LARAMIE COUNTY, WYOMING TO REQUEST FUNDING FOR A DETENTION CENTER BODY SCANNER, AND A COURTHOUSE METAL DETECTOR/X-RAY MACHINE IN THE AMOUNT OF \$214,000.

FOR THE PURPOSE OF: REQUESTED FUNDS WILL BE USED TO PURCHASE A BODY SCANNER FOR THE LARAMIE COUNTY DETENTION CENTER AND TO PURCHASE A METAL DETECTOR AND X-RAY MACHINE FOR THE LARAMIE COUNTY COURTHOUSE.

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Project Description

Project Justification: Community Resilience

Briefly describe the project and how it supports the investment justification.

Laramie County is requesting funding for a two part application that focuses on community resilience through protection and prevention. We are requesting funding to purchase a body scanner and a metal detector with an X-ray component for our detention center and the courthouse.

We are requesting funding to purchase a body scanner for the Laramie County Detention Center and an X-ray machine and metal detector for the Laramie County Courthouse. These devices will be used to help protect deputies assigned to the detention center, as well as, prevent dangerous items from being introduced into the secured areas such as courtrooms. Detention centers and courthouses have a high potential for contraband and weapons to be introduced into the facilities. The requested equipment will help enhance security and increase the ability to quickly identify and take action to neutralize threats as they present themselves. Contraband and weapons being brought into the detention center is a constant threat and when individuals are successful they present a danger to staff, inmates and the public in general. There has been a sharp increase in these types of incidents, and without the capabilities of devices proposed in this application, it is feared they will continue to increase. The body scanner will provide the ability to not only see items on the outside, but items being smuggled inside body cavities. The enhanced X-ray machine and metal detector will provide a side by side comparison, showing the specific area that is suspected and also providing a facial recognition capability for those individuals that have been flagged as high risk.

Within the 2018 Laramie County THIRA our department can contribute to addressing the core capabilities of access control, screening, search and detection along with physical protective measures through the purchase and implementation of the requested equipment.

Describe threats and hazards that create the need.

There is a wide variety of situations that the requested equipment could be utilized for in detecting manmade hazards, weapons, drugs, or terrorist activities. In each of these cases the equipment would help facilitate enhanced security in not allowing dangerous items to come into the detention center or courthouse. Currently, Laramie County does not have a body scanner at the detention facility, scanning is conducted by personnel and this allows for errors in items to pass through without detection. The

detention center does have a metal detector and x-ray machine that is over fifteen years old and deteriorating. Our largest concern is that the items we are looking for in today's environment are not always metal (tobacco and other drugs or make shift weapons). The detention center booking area processes up to sixty people on a given day. Our detention center is currently going through an expansion that will take our facility from a 300 bed to a 450 bed facility that will exponentially increase traffic being processed through security. The body scanner would enhance our ability to detect hidden contraband, which the techniques currently being used (pat or strip search) do not always detect these items.

Currently at the courthouse all individuals entering the courtroom areas are screened. On a routine day, the security desk screens 300 people and this increases when a special event such as a trial is taking place doubling our number to 600 persons passing through security. The proposed system is a fully integrated detection system which allows the x-ray machine and metal detector to be evaluated simultaneously ensuring the screener is assessing each individual item together. We are hoping to add facial recognition as part of the system to enhance the screeners ability to accurately identify individuals that have been identified as threats. We currently have a clipboard with pictures, but with the high traffic experienced by the screening station, this increases the probability that something could be missed. Without the proper equipment our department is unable to provide adequate security to the detention center or courthouse to the capabilities that are expected.

Explain this project's dual applicability to all-hazard events (manmade and natural hazards):

The requested equipment will be able to detect and alert security personnel to hazards that are both manmade and terrorist in nature. We do not foresee the equipment aiding in natural hazards, unless the detention or courthouse were needed for logistical operations.

Identify portions of the THIRA and SPR that the project will address.

Our request of a body scanner, X-ray machine and metal detector addresses the Laramie County THIRA with examination of scene security, protection & law enforcement, operational coordination and infrastructure systems. The THIRA confirmed our known gaps in operational coordination, as the technology is continually evolving. The requested equipment would facilitate accurate and efficient detection of contraband and weapons and would assist preventing them from entering the detention center or courtrooms. Our request will help ensure a safe and secure environment for all those housed, working or doing business with Laramie County.

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How will this project increase capability or reduce vulnerabilities in protecting, preventing, responding, or recovering from an act of terrorism?

The proposed project will increase the county's safety and capacity to serve and protect citizens and inmates. The new equipment will increase capabilities across the board and will reduce detention and courthouse vulnerabilities. This equipment will facilitate proper protection, prevention, and response to include acts of terrorism.

Provide justification on how the project will be maintained, supported, and sustained.

Laramie County will assume all responsibility for the maintenance of the equipment to keep it operational and ready for use. The requested equipment will be sustained by Laramie County for future operations and will be physically installed in the detention center and courthouse. The equipment will be added to our maintenance plan to ensure a long life.

Describe existing capability levels.

Laramie County currently utilizes a metal detector and X-ray in the detention center that is over fifteen years old and is deteriorating. With our request we are asking for a new metal detector and X-ray machine to be placed in the courthouse. The existing equipment from the courthouse would then be relocated to the detention center along with the requested body scanner. The three components will greatly benefit the security process for the detention center and make the facility a safer place for security personnel, inmates and visitors. The current set up is not fully functional and we rely heavily on pat and strip searches allowing for human error in detecting potential threats.

At the courthouse the large volume of individuals being screened illustrates the importance of needing quality equipment that can detect and evaluate items passing through security. We currently do not have the capability for facial recognition and rely on human interaction for this purpose, leaving gaps for errors.

Please provide an overview of the trainings, exercises, real events, or other needs assessments that have identified this as a gap (included the cause of the gap).

Laramie County participates in all area trainings and exercises as appropriate through our departments and elected officials. We are involved in all planning and training efforts coordinated by our EMA office. We participate in all area exercises, trainings, table tops and planning efforts with LCCC, the refinery, CFD and the State when applicable. When we participated in the 2018 THIRA, not having adequate security within infrastructure systems was identified as a concern.

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How will this project reduce capability gaps?

Laramie County will use the equipment to better serve and protect the citizens, inmates and employees of Laramie County. Having the body scanner in the detention center will reduce identified gaps in our inmate security. Our deputies and other inmates will not have to worry about weapons or other contraband being introduced into the population. This equipment will allow for a safer operation for all of those involved.

A key safety component to the courthouse security is the X-ray and metal detector with facial recognition to be installed at the entrance to the courts. The threat of un-allowed items such as weapons is a real risk to those doing business at the courthouse. The new equipment will improve security and reduce these identified gaps.

1. A grant award is anticipated to occur in October 2019. At this time we will establish a budget and accounting line items to prepare for the grant. After funding has been awarded we will go out for a formal bid process according to Laramie County Procurement Policies on both pieces of requested equipment. We are anticipating this will be completed by the end of January 2020.
2. We plan on receiving bids at the beginning of February 2020 and at that time all bids will be evaluated and a vendor selected. We will also be conducting research on the proposed equipment for proper fit for our security needs. Once this process is complete we will be moving forward with our selected vendor to purchase the equipment. We are allocating four months for this process.
3. Beginning in June of 2020 we anticipate receiving the equipment. Immediately following the receipt of the equipment we will inventory and sticker all items prior to installation. We are estimating four months for this process to allow for fluctuating processing and shipping schedules. We anticipate this step being completed by October 15, 2020.
4. During the next milestone, Laramie County will complete our final action to close out and finalize all grant items for the funding from the Wyoming Office of Homeland Security. We anticipate this concluding by November 15, 2020.

Our budget details the larger pieces of equipment such as the body scanner and metal detector themselves with the smaller components including items such as the radiation cabin and X-ray tunnel. When we put together a request for bid we will be specifying the equipment that we are requesting and the various components outlined above to include a warranty and installation.

The county will move forward with expenditures after a formal bid process has occurred and once a vendor(s) has been selected. The gaps identified are operational coordination, scene security, and infrastructure systems. If funded, this equipment will contribute to reducing Laramie County core capability gaps in access control, screening search and detection along with physical protective measures and address the investment priorities under community resilience. We will be able to build on this project for future expansion and strengthening of security operations in both the detention center and courthouse.

Reference: Laramie County's SHSP 2019 Application for Detention Body Scanner and Courthouse Metal Detector/X-ray Machine.

Communication Maintenance and Sustainment Plan

The Department will inventory and track the assignment of the equipment that is purchased with grant funds. There will be regular annual maintenance performed by technicians either through a maintenance contract or through an extended warranty. We intend to utilize the equipment as long as possible and as long as it is supported by vendors for service and parts. With proper handling and maintenance this equipment will be available for many years as a valuable asset to our department and others.

Critical Infrastructure Protection

The sworn Sheriff's Department staff is part of the critical infrastructure protection for Laramie County. They serve as the security providers for the Detention Center as well as for the courthouse and other county government buildings located at the county government complex in downtown Cheyenne. Typically, they will be the first responders should there be a security response needed in the city or county courtrooms or in the event of a critical incident in the county government complex; and typically they will be responding before law enforcement is called to, or arrives at, the complex.

WITNESSETH

WHEREAS, the President in Homeland Security Directive (HSPD)-5, directed the Secretary of the Department of Homeland Security to develop and administer a National Incident Management System (NIMS), which would provide a consistent nationwide approach for Federal, State, and local governments to work together more effectively and efficiently to prevent, prepare for, respond to and recover from domestic incidents, regardless of cause, size or complexity;

WHEREAS, the collective input and guidance from all Federal, State, and local homeland security partners has been, and will continue to be, vital to the development, effective implementation and utilization of a comprehensive NIMS;

WHEREAS, it is necessary and desirable that all Federal, State, and local emergency agencies and personnel coordinate their efforts to effectively and efficiently provide the highest levels of incident management;

WHEREAS, to facilitate the most efficient and effective incident management it is critical that Federal, State, and local organizations utilize standardized terminology, standardized organizational structures, interoperable communications, consolidated action plans, unified command structures, uniform personnel qualification standards, uniform standards for planning, training, and exercising, comprehensive resource management, and designated incident facilities during emergencies or disasters;

WHEREAS, the NIMS standardized procedures for managing personnel, communications, facilities and resources will improve the county's ability to utilize federal funding to enhance local agency readiness, maintain first responder safety, and streamline incident management processes,

WHEREAS, the Incident Command System components of NIMS are already an integral part of various city/county incident management activities, including current emergency management training programs; and

WHEREAS, the National Commission on Terrorist Attacks (9-11 Commission) recommended adoption of a standardized Incident Command System.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF LARAMIE COUNTY that the National Incident Management System (NIMS) is established as the County standard for incident management; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Jeanine West, or her successor in the position of Director of EMA, is appointed as agent of the Laramie County Board of Commissioners to execute and submit items and certifications for NIMS compliance.
